CHAPLAIN USES JAWS OF LIFE IN DOG RESCUE

When Johnny
Hewett joined
Emergency
Chaplains in 2009,
he never dreamed
that he would be
operating the "jaws
of life" to extricate
a dog from a
culvert pipe.
However, that is
exactly where his
chaplaincy has
taken him.

Johnny served with us for about 10 years in Durham, but the Lord called him away from the familiarity of his lifetime home to pastor Pleasant Grove Baptist Church in Green Mountain, NC.



Chaplaincy is in Johnny's blood, and once he settled in serving his congregation Johnny offered his services to the Yancey County Sheriff's Office. Not long after that, the Double Island Fire Department came calling and Johnny joined as a volunteer to serve as their chaplain.

Since joining the fire department, Johnny has been certified as an Emergency Medical Responder and responds regularly on calls.

On June 7, Johnny responded to a call

for an animal in distress. Upon arrival he discovered that Gracie the dog was stuck in a 15-inch culvert pipe. Apparently, she had been chasing some type of critter and traversed the full 25-foot length of the pipe. The pipe exited between some pretty big rocks...and she was stuck right there at the end.

Upon assessing the situation, Johnny returned to the station for the "jaws of life" and he was able to use the spreader tool to move the rock enough to rescue Gracie. Gracie's owner posted on Facebook, "they were able to make a big enough opening through the rocks to pull her out. It was very scary because there was the possibility of the rock above her (which was moving) falling on her and crushing her. Praise God she's safe!!!"
